We are officially DECATHLETES! Our student and faculty team met with great success in City College's very first entry into the prestigious *Solar Decathlon*, an international competition organized by the U.S. Department of Energy and held bi-annually among schools of architecture and engineering on the National Mall in Washington D.C. We were chosen as one of twenty finalists from a large field of applicants. Much thanks to Professors **Christian Volkman**, as well as **Alberto Foyo**, **Fabian Lonch**, and **Hillary Brown** for their efforts with third year BArch students. Joined by participants from the Grove School of Engineering, we will design, build, and transport our 1,000 square foot "net-zero energy" (off-the-grid) residential pavilion to the Capitol where we will operate it as part of a public exhibit in fall 2011. This summer, the team will begin to realize the initial concept with balanced input from faculty, industry, and manufacturers.

Glorious Exhibits


TWO AMBITIOUS exhibits grace the walls of the Spitzer School of Architecture this spring. In the main gallery, "Architecture with and without Le Corbusier," includes an array of artifacts – large models, red lined construction drawings, archival photographs – documenting two projects of architect José Oubrerie, a distinguished visiting professor here last fall. The Eglise Saint-Pierre de Firminy-Vert was begun in 1960 in the atelier of Le Corbusier, where Oubrerie was a young apprentice. The church remained unfinished until 2006, its realization a cross-continental, decades-long process for Oubrerie. The

experimental Miller House in Lexington, Kentucky, was completed in 1992, and stands as a vital link in a chain of stand alone dwellings that engage with Corbu's challenging oeuvre.

The complex installation was coordinated by Director of Exhibitions and Associate Professor Jacob Alspector and realized by an able team led by Shop Director Jorge Plazas, including David Seto, Sergiy Panas, Jorge Diaz, Sanjin Somo, Sean Gunther, Sean Wright, Sebastian Carro, Douglas Ling, and Heaji Kang. The printing and mounting team included Tim Chogovadze, Elton Nureclari, John Vlahakis, Wen Qu,

Wing Peng, Yu Tian Chen, Jorge Miranda, Taimur Gul, Jonathan Carrera and Vikram Singh, under the direction of Assistant Professor M.T. Chang.

Meanwhile, in the corridor outside Dean Ranalli's office on the first floor of SSA, a very special permanent exhibit has been mounted: fifty original prints of gorgeously detailed drawings from the office of Frederick Law Olmsted. The range of projects featured includes parks, campus plans, suburban subdivisions, and parkways. The drawings were a gift from the Olmsted Society, coordinated by Professor Lee Weintraub. ■

in Mumbai. And, he's getting married on December 26! Please send more news! ■


FACULTY NEWS

THIS SEMESTER our two distinguished visiting professors are Teddy Cruz and Brian Healy. Cruz is principal of Estudio Teddy Cruz, based in San Diego, and has focused his practice on the US/Mexico border region. His urban design studio this spring is working in Usme, an informal settlement on the periphery of Bogota, Colombia. Healy, based in Boston, has a distinguished record of designing rigorously detailed buildings.

Associate Professor Jacob Alpector made four guest appearances on *Burning Down the House*, a weekly Internet radio program on architecture. Substitute Assistant Professor Nandini Bagchee, with Maureen Shea, organized the Peace Pentagon Competition, a call for designs for the building at 339 Lafayette, home to many activist groups.

Associate Professor Denise Hoffman Brandt received the 2010 EDRA Metropolis Great Places Award for Research for her project "City Sink." She will be presenting the project at the CELA/ISOMUL conference in Maastricht, Netherlands, and the project is a semi-finalist in the Buckminster Fuller Challenge. Her article "The View from Mrs. Fair's Front Door" was published in *Places* online journal and she will present the paper "Many Lines – Complicated Spaces: Documenting Space and Time in Border Landscapes" at the Society of Architectural Historians Annual Meeting.

ACSA Distinguished Professor Lance Jay Brown, FAIA, delivered the spring 2010 keynote address, "Urban Visions for an Urban Century," to the CCNY's Society of 1847. Also, his work was published in *Architecture Korea*, *Shotenkenchiku*, *Arqart*, *Boutique Design* and *Inkier*. He recently spoke at the IIDA conference "Sustainable Design in a Challenging Market."

Associate Professor **Jeremy Edmiston's** studio **SYSTEMarchitects** was invited to submit ideas for the Future of Fashion at Lincoln Center, which were published in *Women's Wear Daily*. Current projects are in the inaugural edition of *TOWER* magazine. Other recent publications of work include: *10X10_3* (Phiadon), *New Prefab* (Loft Publications), *Prefab Houses* (Links Books), *Green Houses* (Tatlin Press), and the *AD* special issue "Closing the Gap." Edmiston delivered the lecture "BURSTING" at the UTS School of Architecture, the lecture "Finite Variations" at the TRESPA Design Center, and will be a speaker at the Australian AIA national conference.

Professor **Alan Feigenberg** created and led an interactive workshop at the "In Defense of Childhood: Play and Active Learning in Urban Schools" conference at CCNY, engaging participants in an exploration to illustrate how teachers can use the built environment as a resource for math, science, social studies, and language learning.

Adjunct Lecturer **Antonio Furgiuele** presented a paper at the IDEC conference in Atlanta titled "Taste and the Modern Interior," discussing the modern interior as it shifts from reiterating socioeconomic strata to a system of value relations. As part of The Cooper Union Feltman Chair Lectures, Furgiuele presented "Light Grammar & Le Corbusier," his analysis of the syntax of light and photography in the late work.

Professor **Peter Gisolfi**, Chair, has received three design awards: the 2010 Citation of Excellence Award for the Kathleen Allen Lower School at the Hackley School from *Learning by Design*, and two 2009 AIA Design Awards, for the Berman Student Center and Quadrangle at Manhattanville College and for the Kathleen Allen Lower School. In April, he presented the lecture "Master Planning for Independent Schools" at Columbia University Teachers College.

Adjunct Associate Professor **Ali C. Hocek's** firm **AC Hocek Architecture** is engaged in the restoration of 20 Greene Street, an ornamental cast iron façade building in SoHo. ACHA is also renovating the core exhibition at the Museum of the Moving Image in Queens. The original exhibit, by the firm, opened in

1996. Master of Architecture Program Director **Brad Horn's** review of Jan Turnovsky's book *The Poetics of a Wall Projection* was in *The Architect's Newspaper* (Oct. 2009). Adjunct Instructor **Maria Berman** and Horn were featured in *3lux.letters* for their project Char No. 4. Their renovation of a Manhattan townhouse was mentioned in *The New York Times* (April 2010).

Adjunct Professor **Joan Krevlin**, principal of **BKSK Architects**, has been elevated to the AIA College of Fellows in recognition of her contribution to the field of design.

Assistant Professor **Fran Leadon** co-authored with the late Norval White the 5th edition of the *AIA Guide to New York City*, to be published by Oxford University Press on June 7.

A highly detailed villa in Shenzhen, China, designed by Adjunct Professor **Bret Lynch** is featured in the book *Re-Crafted* (Monacelli Press). Lynch received the JAE Best Design as Scholarship Article Award for "No Resistance," co-written with Gustavo Crembil. Also, last fall he lectured and led a design workshop at Musahino Art University, Tokyo.

Dean **George Ranalli's** Saratoga Avenue Community Center in Brooklyn was featured in the article "Stealth by Design:

How the City is Sneaking Great Little Buildings Into Unexpected Places" in *New York Magazine* (Nov. 2009), and in "How the Power of Architecture Changed a Community" in the London *Daily Telegraph* (March 2010). He and his work were also profiled in *Chatham Press*, an upstate New York newspaper, and online in *New York Social Diary*. Paul Goldberger selected the Saratoga Avenue Community Center as one of "The Ten Most Positive Architectural Events of 2009" in *The New Yorker*. In April, Dean Ranalli gave the lecture "In Situ Design: People, History, Place" at the Yale Club of New York.

Associate Professor **Julio Salcedo-Fernandez** was interviewed in the Spanish publication *Capital* (Feb. 2010) in the article "Portada" in which he discussed his practice and research.

Distinguished Professor **Michael Sorkin** won the 2010 Architecture Prize from the American Academy of Arts and Letters. The Michael Sorkin Studio recently won a competition for 4500 units of housing in Tianjin China, and the non-profit Sorkin directs - **Terreform** - was chosen as one of ten teams world-wide to make proposals for transportation

At the Italian Academy for Advanced Study at Columbia University, she presented "Next Stop on the High Line: the Trento Tunnel Project," which was a finalist in the Ossigeno Italiano 2009 Design Competition, run by *Abitare*, and was in their Dec. 2009 issue. Also in *Abitare*, she wrote a tribute to the late Tom Schumacher. With Kurt W. Forster, she delivered the lecture "Vierhaendig im Halbdunkel, oder How I Forgot to Remember" at the Muenster

Kunstakademie, Germany. Adjunct Associate Professor **Albert Vecerka** published the photo essay "A Green Alternative to Dry Cleaning" in *Time* magazine.

Associate Professor **Christian Volkmann** participated in the research-based workshop "Re-Inventing Construction" at the 3rd International Holcim Forum for Sustainable Construction in Mexico City.

Associate Professor **June Williamson's** book *Retrofitting Suburbia* received a 2009 PROSE Award from the Association of American Publishers. An exhibit, "Adapting Suburbs in the 21st Century," based on the book, was organized by the Rochester Regional Community Design Center and will travel to Atlanta and Seattle. She delivered the 2009 Candeub Memorial Lecture at the Boustein School at Rutgers and is Advisor to the ongoing Build a Better Burb ideas competition, sponsored by the Long Island Index. ■

IN MEMORIAM

We would like to pause at the end of this newsletter to remember key figures in the history of the Spitzer School of Architecture who have recently passed away:

J. Max Bond Jr., long the most influential African-American architect in New York City with a rich legacy of significant built work, and Dean of our School from 1985 to 1992, died in February 2009. At his death, he was the partner-in-charge at Davis Brody Bond Aedas of the museum portion of the National September 11 Memorial and Museum at the World Trade Center.

Professor Emeritus **Norval White**, the founding Chair of our School,

died of a heart attack in Roques, France, in December, 2009, just months before the completion of the 5th edition of the *AIA Guide to New York City*, which he was co-authoring with Assistant Professor Fran Leadon. All are invited to celebrate his legacy at the launch party for the Guide, to be held on June 2 at the Center for Architecture.

Charles Zucker, a founding faculty member of our School (1969-1976), died in February 2010 in Boulder, Colorado, where, as an expert in participatory design processes, he had been Senior Urban Designer of that city's progressive Planning Department.
